Introduction

A great couple of days of squash was witnessed in Wolverhampton as the three Services battled it out for squash glory after a last-minute switch of venue from Portsmouth. The Army was victorious in 3 of the 4 team categories, emulating the same achievement in the previous two years. The Army Squash family also enjoyed a superb mid-event social gathering at the nearby Siculo Italian restaurant fostering team building and morale while enjoying themselves off court. The Team Captains have their own stories to share, adding to the excitement of this memorable event.

Mens Report (Smart, Jones, Boys, Thomas, May)

The men's senior competition this year was fiercely contested. The Army team recognised the Royal Air Force (RAF) as their primary rivals, given their exceptionally strong lineup. Additionally, we were aware that the Royal Navy might be slightly disadvantaged due to the absence of their top-ranked player, who was deployed on an operational tour.

The RAF were up vs the Navy first. The RAF came up trumps with a 5-0 win which meant the Army's first match would be vs the Navy on afternoon #1.

The Army's first match of the day was at number 3. The men's captain, Dean Boys, expertly dispatched his tricky opponent 3-1. Next up was number 4 - with Mark Thomas stepping up a number, he had a fantastic match, a battle for the ages and won 3-2! Stand out performance of the match.
